

## Arsenic & Old Lace Afghan/Scarf KAL: Insertion #3/3

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This stitch is called: “Diagonal Design in Knitting” and was used in the 1800’s either as a square or for insertions. Unusually, it was recommended to be used with multiple colors for a knit afghan.

Materials: 80-100 yards any worsted weight wool or cotton yarn, US8 needles

Gauge: 18 sts and 24 rows = 4 inches in Stockinette Stitch

Abbreviations: K = knit P = purl YO=yarnover  
K2tog = knit 2 sts together Sl = slip a st p-wise  
SSK=sl1 k-wise, sl second st k-wise, insert LH needle through the 2 sts (point to point) and knit the two sts together.

Seed= \*K1, P1; repeat from \* to last st, K1.

TBL = through the back loop

Pick up a stitch at the bottom of the last completed strip with the right side of the work facing you and then knit cast-on 21 sts to the needle. Begin this insertion as follows:

Set-up Row 1: Seed to last of 21 sts, K2tbl (to connect insertion the the strip of the afghan), turn so wrong side is facing.

Set-up Row 2: pick up a new st from strip and seed across the 21 sts, turn

Set-up Row 3: see row 1

Set-up Row 4: see row 2

Set-up Row 5: see row 1

Set-up Row 6: pick up a new st from strip and purl across the 21 sts, turn

Diagonal Lace Design Stitch Pattern:

Set-up Row (RS): (K1, YO, K2tog, K4, K2tog, YO) X 2, K1, YO, K1, K2tog TBL.

Set-up Row (WS): PURL

Row 1: K1, (YO, K2tog, K3, K2tog, YO, K2) X 2, YO, K2tog, K2tog TBL.

Row 2: Pick up edge stitch from side of strip, PURL

Row 3: K1, (YO, K2tog, K2, K2tog, YO, K3) X 2, YO, K2tog, K2tog TBL.

Row 4: Pick up edge stitch from side of strip, PURL

Row 5: K1, (YO, K2tog, K1, K2tog, YO, K4) X 2, YO, K2tog, K2tog TBL.

Row 6: Pick up edge stitch from side of strip, PURL

Row 7: K1, (YO, (K2tog) X 2, YO, K5) X 2, YO, K2tog, K2tog TBL.

Row 8: Pick up edge stitch from side of strip, PURL

Row 9: (K1, YO, K2TOG, K4, K2TOG, YO) X 2, K1, YO, K2tog, K2tog TBL.

Row10: Pick up edge stitch from side of strip, PURL

Repeat rows 1-10 until the insertion is up to those last five rows of seed stitch on the strip to which you are joining this insertion. Decrease back to 21 stitches and repeat the initial set up seed stitch rows...leaving the stitches live and on a stitch holder for ease of joining the edging.
